Foreword from Sean Joyce

The first Stephensons crime report, published in August 2016, provided a valuable glimpse into the UK's attitudes towards the law through the eye of the general public. It was – and remains – a study driven by what I believe to be a great misconception about the work of criminal defence lawyers and the clients that they represent.



It is my belief that the vast majority of those who call upon the services of a criminal defence lawyer, whether it is for a minor motoring incident or for something more serious, are not hardened habitual offenders. In my experience, they are ordinary people who, through a moment of weakness or madness, find themselves in extraordinary circumstances and on the wrong side of the criminal justice system.

Indeed, many of us – regardless of who we are, where we come from or whatever our social background – will, at some point in our lives, require the services of a criminal defence solicitor.

Does that mean that the United Kingdom is awash with criminals? Certainly not. Yet the stigma attached to instructing a criminal solicitor is still ever present.

The Stephensons Crime Report sets out to account for this disparity – the gulf between the perception and the reality. The fact that the overwhelming majority of criminal cases involve individuals with no previous convictions; that we witness offences being committed every day, even by friends and relatives and yet we do not class them – in an everyday sense – as 'offenders'.

In the 2016 report, an overwhelming majority (97 per cent) of those polled claimed that they were a law abiding citizen. This statistic was no great surprise to me and my colleagues, but the fact that nearly two-thirds of that same sample went on to admit to committing one or more offences in the past twelve months gave credence to our long-held understanding that, under the correct circumstances, very many people will willingly break the law.

What is more, the 2016 findings show that those same people were – in the main – willing to justify their actions. Nearly half (47 per cent) said they believed their offence was minor in nature, while others (44 per cent) said they believed their actions were acceptable because they observed others doing the same.

One year on, we have once again looked to gain insight into the everyday criminal activities taking place in the UK and to illustrate the often unacknowledged permissive attitude towards these 'petty' or 'minor' offences.

Executive Summary

In July 2017, Stephensons commissioned a study into the everyday, criminal habits of the UK population. A **nationally representative sample of 2,003 people** was consulted, and asked to identify offences which they had committed in the past year.

Before taking the survey, each respondent was asked if they considered themselves a 'law abiding citizen'. In answer to this question, **96 per cent** (more than nine out of ten), said that they considered themselves a law abiding citizen.

Respondents were then presented with a grid of 'everyday crimes'. These ranged from **motoring offences**, to **littering**, **cycling on the pavement**, **failing to pay on public transport** and **illegally downloading or streaming films, music or sport**.

In total, **over half of all those polled (53 per cent)** admitted to committing one or more of the listed offences in the past 12 months, **rising to two-thirds (67 per cent)** among the 25-34 age group – the highest among all age groups.

According to the figures gathered, of the 96 per cent who asserted they were 'law abiding citizens' more than half (**53 per cent**) later admitted to one or more offence, suggesting either they were being untruthful or were mistaken in their assertion.

Top Ten 'Everyday Crimes' Committed in the UK in the Past Year

1. Driving over the speed limit
2. Eating or drinking while driving
3. Downloading, copying or streaming music, films, television or other content, illegally
4. Using a mobile phone while driving
5. Dropping litter (incl. cigarette butts, gum)
6. Cycling on the pavement
7. Parking on, or partly on the pavement where not permitted
8. Urinating in a public place
9. Parking in restricted areas (disabled bay, double yellow lines etc.)
10. Taking illegal substances (ie: drugs)

Driving offences – including '**driving over the speed limit**' (30 per cent), '**eating or drinking while driving**' (19 per cent) and '**using a mobile phone while driving**' (8 per cent) – made up three of the top five crimes committed, alongside '**downloading, copying or streaming media**' (12 per cent) and '**dropping litter**' (8 per cent).

31 per cent of respondents admitted to **committing two types of offences** in the past year, while 11 per cent admitted to committing **four**, and seven per cent committed **five**.

Those polled were also asked to explain the reason for the actions where they could. More than half (53 per cent) of the offenders admitted that they had **no excuse** for committing the offence/s, while only 27 per cent said that they **regretted their decision**.

However, close to half (43 per cent) said that they broke the law because they believed it was a '**minor**' crime and 41 per cent said they did so because everyone else did. 35 per cent of said that they broke the law because they knew they would not get caught.

Many believed that their actions were justifiable because '**it was a victimless crime**' (44 per cent) and nearly a quarter said that they committed the crime because they **disagreed with the law** (24 per cent).

Analysis: Gender, age, regional demographics

The 2017 report illustrates a number of distinct differences in attitudes towards the law and the ‘everyday’ criminal acts listed. In particular, the contrasts between the data from male and female respondents and the variation between age groups are particularly striking.

In addition to the summary below, a complete data set can be found in the full report on page 9 of this document.

Gender

In answer to Q1 of the survey – ‘do you consider yourself to be a law abiding citizen?’ – the overall response in favour of ‘yes’ was 96 per cent. Equally, when analysing the data from male and female respondents, the same proportion of people – 96 per cent – identified as law abiding in each case.

However, when examining the results of Q2, a considerable difference emerges. In the case of male respondents, 61 per cent said that they had committed one or more criminal acts over the past twelve months. **Female respondents, however, were far less likely to commit one or more criminal acts** – just 45 per cent.

This illustrates that a greater proportion of men than women were either mistaken or being untruthful in their assertion that they were a ‘law abiding citizen’ in Q1.

Of further interest are the responses in Q3 where those polled were asked to explain the reasoning behind their actions, if they could.

Across the majority of responses **men were more likely to justify their actions by diminishing the seriousness of their offence**: ‘I did it because everybody does it’; ‘I did it because it was a victimless crime’; ‘I did it because I knew I wouldn’t get caught’; ‘I did it because I disagree with the law’.

On the other hand, **female respondents were more likely to reflect upon their actions with feelings of remorse and less likely to justify their actions**: ‘I have no excuse for breaking the law’ and ‘I regret breaking the law in this way’. In both cases, female respondents identified with these statements by six more percentage points (50/56, 25/31).

The only instance in which this was not true is in response to the statement ‘I did it because it was a minor crime’, where 45 per cent of women agreed, compared to 43 per cent of men.

Age

Across the age groups, similar disparity can be found.

As an average, 96 per cent of respondents said that they identified as a ‘law abiding citizen’. However, those in the 25 to 34 age group were significantly less likely to identify as such (90 per cent) while those in the 55 to 64 and 65+ groups were most likely to respond positively to this statement (99 per cent). This is a difference of nearly 10 percentage points.

Across broader generational groups, those aged 18-34 – the group which is largely known as the ‘**millennial**’ generation – were least likely to say they were ‘law abiding’ (90 per cent), while those aged 55 and over – the group which is largely known as the ‘**baby boomer**’ generation, were most likely (99 per cent).

Elsewhere a similar pattern persists. **Millennials were most likely to have committed one or more criminal offences** in the past year (66 per cent), compared with a 53 per cent average. Meanwhile the **baby boomers were least likely to have committed an offence** (40 per cent).

However, when examining the age groups in more detail, those aged **18-24 were seven percentage points less likely to have committed an offence than those ten-years their senior**, suggesting that 'everyday' criminal behaviour peaks between the ages of 25 and 34. In all groups which followed, the tendency to commit an offence decreased. **By the age of 65, only 37 per cent said that they had committed one or more offences in the past year.**

Only in the 55 to 64 and 65+ categories did fewer than 50 per cent of respondents say they had committed an offence.

In Q3, **millennials were generally more likely to agree with statements which looked to explain or justify their actions**, whereas those aged 55 and over were least likely.

Equally, **millennials were less likely to look beyond the immediate impact of their actions**, with nearly 3 in 5 (57 per cent) saying that they acted as they did because 'it was a victimless crime'. Again, those over 55 were least likely to agree with this statement (32 per cent).

Over **55's were also less likely to view their actions as a 'minor' crime** (35 per cent) compared to those aged 18 to 34 (54 per cent). However, millennials were more likely to say that they had 'no excuse for their actions' (52 per cent) compared to those aged 34 to 54 (48 per cent), but less likely than those aged 55 and over (59 per cent).

Regions and cities

Regional and nearest city data shows considerable variation, particularly in comparing London to the rest of the UK.

In response to Q1 – 'do you consider yourself a law abiding citizen' – 95 per cent or more agreed in all regions across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland, **except in the case of London, where only 90 per cent agreed.**

A similar pattern is evident in the nearest city data, where **London has the lowest 'law abiding' figure** – 94 per cent – with Manchester and Cardiff a close second (95 per cent). Meanwhile, **in Nottingham, Norwich, Newcastle and Brighton, 99 per cent said that they considered themselves law abiding.**

However, in Q2, **London was only the seventh 'most likely to offend' city** with 54 per cent of people saying they committed one or more crime in the past year. While above the national average, this was below other major cities, such as Bristol (67 per cent), Belfast (62 per cent), Cardiff (59 per cent), Newcastle (57 per cent) and Liverpool (56 per cent).

Norwich was the city least likely to commit an offence (45 per cent), with Southampton, Glasgow, Birmingham and Nottingham all in the bottom five.

Among regions, **Northern Ireland was most likely to have committed an offence (62 per cent)**, followed by the North East of England (60 per cent), Wales (57 per cent) and the South West of England (56 per cent). 55 per cent of respondents in London, Yorkshire and Humber and North West England committed an offence.

MILLENNIALS ‘driving an indifferent attitude to crime’ as study shows group is MOST likely to break the law

- Those aged under-35 are most likely to have committed an offence in past year
- Offences included speeding, taking illegal substances and urinating in public
- Millennials also most likely to try and justify criminal behaviour



A new survey suggests that those under the age of 35 are driving an ‘indifferent attitude to crime’ as millennials are revealed as the group most likely to have committed a criminal offence in the past year.

A report by the national law firm, Stephensons, reveals that more than 50 per cent of UK adults admit to committing one or more ‘everyday crime’ in the past year, but many are in complete denial about their offending, with 96 per cent claiming to be a ‘law abiding citizen’.

However, millennials – those aged between 18 and 34 – are most likely to offend, with nearly 70 per cent admitting to criminal activity in the past twelve months. Millennials were also the group least likely to identify as a ‘law abiding citizen’ – 90 per cent.

By contrast, 99 per cent of ‘baby boomers’ suggested they were a law abiding citizen and were the group least likely to have committed an offence.

According to the report, younger people are more likely to try and justify or explain away criminal acts and more than half of those aged 18-24 claimed they ‘knew they wouldn’t get caught’.

Top Ten ‘Everyday Crimes’ Committed in the UK

1. Driving over the speed limit
2. Eating or drinking while driving
3. Downloading, copying or streaming music, films, television or other content, illegally
4. Using a mobile phone while driving
5. Dropping litter (incl. cigarette butts, gum)

9. Parking in restricted areas (disabled bay, double yellow lines etc.)

The findings also reveal that men are far more likely to have committed an offence in the past twelve months – 61 per cent - compared to less than half of women. Equally, men were more likely to try and downplay their law breaking, while women were more likely to express remorse or regret for their actions.

Driving offences - including breaking the speed limit, eating or drinking behind the wheel and using a mobile phone while driving - made up three of the top five offences committed in the past year, alongside dropping litter and illegally downloading, streaming or torrenting films, music and video games.

Other offences included driving through a red light, failing to be registered on the electoral roll, theft from supermarkets or the workplace and urinating in public.

Only a quarter of those polled said that they regretted their actions, but a similar figure – 24 per cent – said that committing the crime was justified because they ‘disagreed with the law’.

Sean Joyce, Head of Regulatory and Criminal Justice at Stephensons, who commissioned the study, said: “The research shows that many millions of people in the UK are breaking the law on a day-to-day basis.

“What is striking is the apparent differences in the perceived impact and ramifications of such acts between the generations.

“In my experience, because these types of offences are often seen as ‘minor’ in nature – perhaps because they are committed so often and by so many – they do not produce the feelings of guilt or remorse that might be associated with more ‘serious’ crimes.

“However, they remain very much illegal and those who are caught could face severe penalties, including prosecution, a fine, a custodial sentence and a criminal record.”

In comparing the 2017 results to 2016, the overall picture of the crimes most committed remain largely the same, though with some significant changes. The top-five results remain unchanged, save for **'using a mobile phone while driving'** and **'dropping litter'** trading places at four and five.

The biggest change inside the top 20 results is **'parking in restricted areas'** which climbs three places to nine. The biggest change overall is in individuals **'not being registered on the electoral roll'** (19), up six places from 2016.

The biggest fall is in those admitting to **'driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs'**, down four places from 2016.

Methodology

This study has been commissioned by Stephensons Solicitors LLP.

The research was conducted in conjunction with Opinium, a member of the British Polling Council, using an online questionnaire format. The survey was conducted between the 4/6 July 2017 with a nationally representative sample of 2,003 UK adults (18+).

- The sample was chosen to best reflect the UK population at the time. However, given the need to maintain a statistically significant sample size, some demographics may be over or under represented. In particular, the survey does not include those under the age of 18.
- As the survey was carried out online, the results will under-represent demographics who are statistically less likely to be regular users of the internet and digital media. Typically, this includes older, less affluent individuals or those with limited formal education.
- In total, the survey contained 29 so-called 'everyday crimes'. While this is by no means an exhaustive list of offences that respondents could commit, it broadly encompasses offences that some may consider 'minor' in nature, while excluding more serious offences that respondents might be less likely to admit. Users also had the option to select 'none of the above', 'I have committed an offence that is not listed here' or 'I have committed an offence that is more serious than those listed here'.
- The survey is unable to account for the truthfulness of the responses provided. While all results are anonymised and cannot be identified as belonging to any of those surveyed, it is acknowledged that some respondents might be less willing to admit to offences than others. As such, we anticipate that the findings of this report are lower than in reality.
